Vacancies – Due to resignations, there are two vacancies on the Parish Council. The role entails attending a Parish Council meeting every other month, for around 2 hours and you can put in, as much or as little time as you have available, in-between the meetings. Wheelie Bins - Residents are kindly requested not to block the footpaths with their wheelie bins, where possible. If they could also be collected back in as soon as they had been emptied, this would avoid the footpaths being blocked for those pedestrians with pushchairs or wheelchair users.

Play Area – The Section 106 funds from the Oak Farm Phase 2 development were due to be paid to Cherwell District Council shortly. Quotes for the new play equipment were in the process of being sought. Cherwell District Council were due to cut back the trees which are overhanging from the Dovecote into the play area.

Dog Fouling – Residents are asked to ensure that they clean up after their dogs because a lot of mess had not be picked up, especially along Main Street. Dog waste bags are available from New Road Stores and the Church

Snow Warden/Grit Bin - If anyone in the village would to volunteer to be a Snow Warden to help clear the footpaths in adverse weather conditions, please contact the Clerk to the Parish Council. A new grit bin had been installed at the entrance to Dovecote Close.

Village Hall – The Hall was still closed due to the Covid-19 Pandemic, however the Committee is planning something for children at Easter as Christmas activities were cancelled. The Parish Council agreed to make a financial contribution to the event.

Highways – Repairs which were required to potholes should be reported to the County . Council's Fix My Street web site. https:// fixmystreet.oxfordshire.gov.uk/ New road

markings had been painted on the road by the junction at the Horse and Groom.

Grass Cutting Contact - The contract for 2021/2022 was awarded to Nigel Prickett.

Trees/Bushes/Hedges - Residents were reminded that trees/bushes/hedges should not be causing an obstruction because they were overhanging a boundary onto a footpath or road. If an obstruction was occurring in the village, it should be reported to https:// fixmystreet.oxfordshire.gov.uk/

Oxfordshire County Council works closely with all its partners to monitor the weather and as a reminder there are some numbers that you can call to report weather related issues if you become aware of them:

- To report fallen trees or other debris which doesn't pose such a high risk but still needs to be dealt with, please call 101
- If you lose power or can see that a power line has come down please report it by calling 105

- To report flooding from a main river contact the Environment Agency through the Floodline (Tel: 0345 988 1188 or 0800 80 70 60) or visit their website

VILLAGE HALLS AND COMMUNITY

CENTRES, due to their communal nature, are vulnerable to the spread of Coronavirus. Much depends on the size of the facility and space available as the 2- meter social distancing must be strictly adhered to and consideration given to pinch points such as entrances and exists and particularly in Milcombe Village Hall the narrow passageway to toilets and kitchen area.

Further information can be found on COVID 19 GUIDANCE FOR THE SAFE USE OF MULTIPURPOSE COMMUNITY FACILITIES issued by the Ministry of Housing, Communities and Local Government 5.1.2021. Due to this latest guidance and the 4th lockdown currently in place, regrettably Milcombe Village Hall remains closed. It is an ever-changing situation which the trustees of the Village Hall will continue to monitor.

The Countryside Code

The Countryside Code gives advice on how you can enjoy your visit to the countryside and also act responsibly to protect the countryside. The code explains that is important to plan ahead, stay safe, control your dog near livestock and prevent fires.

The code

The following simple messages make up the Countryside Code.

Respect the people who live and work in the countryside. Show courtesy and consideration to everybody. Be a friendly visitor with a responsible way. Know where you are allowed to go

Most land is private property and access is only available with the goodwill and tolerance of the owner. Whilst most landowners do not object to recreational users on their land, some do. Always respect a landowner's wishes.

Keep to paths across farmland

Help prevent damage to crops by walking around the edge of a field unless there is an existing path across it.

Avoid fields where there are animals, as your presence may cause them stress and endanger your own safety.

Use gates and stiles to cross fences, hedges and walls. **When crossing fences**, hedges and walls, use the nearest gate or stile. Damage to fencing can allow animals to stray. If you must climb a gate because it is difficult to open, always do this at the hinged end.

Leave gates as you find them

If you find a gate closed, close it when you pass through to prevent animals straying. Farmers sometimes leave gates open to allow animals to pass from one field to another to graze or drink. Help a farmer by leaving gates as you find them. If in doubt, close a gate. Do not interfere with livestock, machinery and crops. These are valuable commodities and should be left alone. Interference with animals and equipment may endanger you. Pay attention to warning signs as these are for your protection.

Keep dogs under control

Keep your dog on a lead when walking on roads or when close to farm animals. A dog can cause distress to animals and endanger you. Keep your dog under control always so as not to disturb wildlife or annoy or frighten other visitors.

Protect wildlife, plants and trees

Leave all natural places as you find them. Never uproot plants as they will be lost forever. Keep your distance from wild birds and animals to prevent disturbance and stress especially to adults that are with young and in winter when food may be scarce or weather harsh. Keep all water sources clean

The public water supply is not available to everyone living in the countryside. Take care with your personal hygiene and do not pollute water. Don't interfere with water troughs which provide clean water for livestock.

Take your litter home

All litter is unsightly. Glass, tins and plastic bags can be dangerous to people, livestock and wildlife. Keep the countryside clean by taking home your own litter and any which you may find. Guard against all risk of fire

The countryside is vulnerable to fire especially during dry weather. Accidental fires pose a great risk to farmers and foresters. Be careful to extinguish all used matches and cigarettes. Use a stove for cooking rather than a fire. Never throw cigarettes from a car window.

Make no unnecessary noise

One of the attractions of the countryside is its peace and quiet. Do not disturb this with noise or disruptive behaviour which might annoy residents and visitors or frighten farm animals and wildlife.

Respect other recreational users

Behave responsibly. Where possible, warn others of your approach and slow down or stop if necessary. Irresponsible behaviour could lead to you and your activity being banned from the area in the future.

Take special care on country roads

Always drive carefully with reduced speed on country roads. Consider others when parking and avoid blocking entrances, gateways or other drivers' visibility. Walkers should take special care on narrow country roads and if uncertain should walk in single file.

Consider your personal safety

If possible do not go alone. Wear suitable clothing and footwear as the weather can change very quickly.

children's hands.


Parents should remind children NOT to touch their faces, to cough or sneeze into a tissue or arm if tissue not available, and not to put their mouths



SERVICES IN ST. LAURENCE'S CHURCH

STAY SAFE

We are currently in a third lockdown and, although not all Churches are closed for public worship, it has been decided for safety reasons not to hold any Services during February. Because fewer members have been attending Sunday Services due to the Government guidelines to stay at home, it was agreed that this would be for the best. However, even though there are no Services, the Church will still be OPEN FOR PRIVATE PRAYER ON SUNDAY MORNINGS AND WEDNESDAY AFTERNOONS. PLEASE STAY 2 METRES APART IF THERE IS ANYBODY ELSE IN THE CHURCH AND ALWAYS WEAR A FACE MASK IN THE BUILDING. It is for your own safety as well as for the safety of everybody else. You may, of course, walk around the Churchyard and tend graves but it is still necessary to keep to the 2m social distancing unless with a member of your own household.

At present there is a Service of HOLY COMMUNION EVERY SUNDAY MORNING IN ST. MARY'S, BLOXHAM, AT 9.30am. There is better seating capacity and St. Mary's is better able to offer 2m social distancing.
